

#### 6. Governance, Leadership and Management

#### 6.1. State the Vision and Mission of the institution

Mahishadal Raj College is the third oldest college in the undivided district of Midnapore and fiftieth one under University of Calcutta. The college was founded on August 1, 1946 by Kumar Debaprasad Garga Bahadur, the 'Raja' of Mahishadal and a celebrity in the field of music and fine arts. Now the college is affiliated to Vidyasagar University since 01.06.1985. Situated only twenty kilometers from both Haldia (a potential industrial town of W.B.) and Tamluk (the district headquarter of Purba Medinipur) the college has immensely benefited from its location in a pleasant, placid countryside.

The logo of the college properly reflects its mission. They are Wisdom, Values and Progress. Founded by the Mahishadal Raj during the days of fierce freedom movement at Mahishadal to enable the poor rural boys and girls to promote their higher studies at a very low cost ("after matriculation they had to give up higher studies due to prohibitive cost of education in the metropolis") and to bring prosperity in the area by diffusing the light of education and to inculcate high values, the college to-day is also committed to providing excellence in education at the undergraduate level in order to empower the rural youth with breadth of knowledge and depth of experience that provide meaningful contribution to their career and also to the community. For this purpose, during the last six decades, the college geared all its academic and extension activities in this direction. To achieve the goals stated in the mission statement the college faithfully follows the following basic objectives:

- i) To provide qualitative and useful teaching in order to prepare the students for higher education.
- ii) To develop personality, quality of leadership and good citizenship in students.
- iii) To inculcate ethical and moral values.
- iv) To create teachers for the future generation.
- v) To prepare the students for entering into a bright career, meeting the social, economic and other challenges, and contributing to peace, human unity and universal welfare.
- vi) To enhance creative skills.
- vii) To develop sense of social services and patriotism through community services.

Our institution has been trying to take steps in developing human and cultural values among the students to fulfill the needs of the society. Some such activities are listed below:

- The National Service Scheme (4-units) follows the moto "NOT ME BUT YOU". It has four adopted villages in every week and set up different awareness programmes. In the Special Puja Camp the volunteers clean the wild plants & herbs, abominable materials and cast-off to save the villagers from environmental pollution. They also clean the drains of the Mahishdal Hospital and other drains of Mahishadal main area.
  - The National Service Scheme of the college has the linkage with the Consumers Affairs & Fair Business Practice, Department of Govt. of India, the Health Deptt., Govt. of W.B., Lions Club of Mahishadal, Naikundi Janakalyan Samiti, and organized Consumer awareness seminar, TB awareness seminar, Pulse Polio motivation campaign and may other society concerned programmes.
- ii) The Cadets of NCC unit have organized an AIDS Awareness Programme in the area of Mahishadal and Haldia.
- iii) The college has established a "Medical and First Aid Centre" of its own which is regularly attend by a registered medical practitioner. The college has signed a "MOU" with "Bipanna Bandhu", a local charitable organization for Ambulance Service, emergency trained staff for medical care, oxygen cylinder etc.
- iv) A Yoga Centre has been established where training on Yoga is given by experts.
- v) The cultural unit of the college has taken some steps to organize and celebrate different cultural events and the students play leadership role in University Inter College Cultural Competition.
- vi) In the Sports Unit of the college, the students play a leadership role in University Inter College Sports Competition.
- vii) In the Youth Parliament Competition, the students of the college have played vital role in District and State Level Competition.
- viii) The Blood Donation Camp has been organized by the college authority and Students' Union in a fixed day of every year.
- ix) The college conducts educational tour every year before the Puja Holidays. The tour is guided by the teachers and the staff of the college.

#### **Best Practice - 1**

#### 1. Title of the Practice:

Non- linear fuzzy model for poverty measurement with bureaucracy and corporate social responsibility (CSR) and others

#### 2. **Goal:**

The goal of introducing the practice is to attract the students, Researchers and Teachers in different types of uncertainty and also to measure them in different sectors/levels. The aim of the college authority is to improve research mentality of the teachers of the Department of Mathematics. Our aim is to measure the uncertainty of the poverty level of the world, pollution in different level production sectors, pollution due to use of pesticides and fertilizers' in Agricultural field etc by introducing Fuzzy Model. The aim of the management of different production sectors performed by different types of CSR is to minimize poverty level of the community. But this is not an easy process because the uncertainty parameters arise in the performance of CSR and in the measurement of poverty level of the community. Purpose of our research interest is to investigate the situation and to help them (Management of the production sector) by applying different techniques of uncertainty measurement and various optimization methods for minimizing the poverty level of the community.

#### 3. The context:

- (a) Fuzzy Set Theory: The fuzzy set theory was developed to define and solve the complex system with sources of uncertainty of imprecision which are non-stochastic in nature; Fuzzy set theory is a theory of graded concept (a matter of degree) but not a theory of chance or probability.
- (b) Crisp set: A classical set is defined by crisp boundaries I.e. There is no uncertainty in the prescriptions of the elements of the set.

A classical or crisp set is normally defined as a well defined collection of elements or objects  $x \in X$  which can be fine, countable or uncountable.

(c) Fuzzy set: A Fuzzy set is a class of objects in which there is no sharp boundary between those objects that belong to the class and those that do not.

Let x be a collection of objects and x be an element of x, then a fuzzy set A in x is a set of ordered pairs  $\tilde{A} = \{(x, \, \mu_A(x)) / \, x \in X\}$ , where  $\mu_A(x)$  is called the membership function or grade of membership of x in  $\tilde{A}$  which maps x to the membership space M which is considered as the closed interval [0,1].

It is noted that  $\hat{A}$  becomes a non-fuzzy set (or Crisp set) and  $\mu_A(x)$  reduces to the characteristic function of the non-fuzzy set (or Crisp set) when M consists of only two points 0 and 1 .

- (d) Equality: Two-fuzzy set  $\hat{A}$ ,  $\tilde{B}$  are said to equal if and only if  $\mu_A(x) = \mu_B(x)$ ,  $\forall x \in X$
- (e) Containment: a fuzzy set a2 is contained in or is a subset of a fuzzy set B2, written as  $\tilde{A}C\tilde{B}$  if and only if  $\mu_A(x) \le \mu_B(x)$ ,  $\forall x \in X$ .
- (f) Support : The support of a fuzzy set  $\hat{A}$  is a crisp set  $S(\hat{A})$  such that  $x \in S(\hat{A}) \leftrightarrow \mu_A(x) > 0$
- (g) Normality: A fuzzy set  $\hat{A}$  is called normal if and only if  $\max_{x \in X} \mu(x) = 1$

#### 4. The practice:

The teachers & Researches of the Mathematics Department have taken some melodically steps applying fuzzy uncertain Model on different fields and published the results on different reputed journals, we hence focused here one of the field.

- (i) To understand and cope up with the poverty, so many approaches like-sin's willingness approach (1976), food energy intake (FEI) matured, marginal utility of income matured, sociological perspective, axioms of income distribution, income gap ratio etc. generally follows for policy measures. The Researchers have developed the inexactness or fuzzy poverty measurement problem.
- (ii) A poverty line can be defined as the money needed to achieve the minimum level of "well-being "that is required to not be deemed 'poor'. Thus everyone at the poverty line (no matter what sub-group they happen to belong) is deemed to be equally boldly off and all those below the line are worse off than all those above it.
- (iii) While versions of this approach go back a long way in philosophy and the social sciences, it can be characterized today in the terms of Amartya Sen's argument that "well-being" should be thought of in terms of a person's capabilities i.e. the functioning ("beings and doings") that a person is able to achieve. By this view, poverty means not having an income sufficient to support specific normative functioning utility- as the attainment of personal satisfaction-can be viewed as one such functioning relevant to well- being. But it is only one of the functioning that matter. Independently of utility, one might say that a person is better off if she is able to participate fully in social and economic activity.
- (iv) The method finds the consumption expenditure or income level at which food energy intake is just sufficient to meet pre-determined food energy requirements for good health and normal activity levels (such caloric requirements are given in WHO, for example). To deal with the fact that food energy intakes naturally vary with a given income level, the FEI method typically calculates an expected value of intake at given income. The poverty line is defined as the cost of specific baskets of goods and services that are deemed necessary for an individual to maintain health and a minimum activity levels, both personal and social, taking account of the geographic setting (notably climate).

- (v) The first is based on the traditional economic view that the marginal utility of income and hence marginal deprivation from the lack of income is higher at low incomes.
- (vi) A second line of argument draws from a sociological perspective that relative deprivation is more acute at lower incomes.
- (vii) A third argument is that, at a descriptive level, there is 'a' significant difference between a distribution a in which all poor incomes are located at their mean and another distribution 'b' having identical H and I in which the poor incomes range from extremely low to right up against the poverty line. Symmetry: If 'a' is obtained from 'b' by a permutation of incomes, then P (a; b)=P(b; d). In conjunction with the above axioms, it ensures that whenever two income distributions have normalized income distribution whose cumulative distribution functions are identical on the interval [0,1], they must have the same poverty value. Focus: If 'A' is obtained from 'b' by an increment to a non poor person, then P (a; b)=P(b; d).
- (viii) The focus axiom says that changing non-poor incomes without altering the number of the poor leaves the poverty value unchanged. The axiom defines on the key aspects of a measurement of poverty, as opposed to inequality or other characteristics of the distribution: it depends on the incomes of the poor while ignoring the incomes of the non-poor (But not necessarily their number). However, the balanced income growth may come from employment generation through FDI flow as far as the Globalize under Developed countries (UDC'S) are concerned consistent with the CSR based development approach. Although the axiomatic approach to analyses the developmental issue on poverty measurement as has been interpreted by Martine Ravllion and Michael Lokshin, 2006; scale Invariance : If (a ;d ) by a proportional change, then P(a; b) =P(a; d).
- (ix) For measurement satisfying scale invariance, comparability at different poverty lines is obtained by allowing the poverty line 'd' itself to be the unit of measure. The in variance axioms are useful in identifying the information that a poverty measure can use in arriving at the over all level of poverty, but leave the shape of the function unrestricted. Where frequency and average depths remain unchanged and in equality among the poor falls, the transfer axiom requires overall poverty to follow the third partial index (in equality among the poor). The monotonicity axiom ensures that the poverty level must fall whenever a poor income rises but stays poor. A reasonable case may be mode for expanding this axiom to address the situation where the poor income rises above the poverty line.
- (x) The strong monotonicity axiom adds one additional requirement: that if the frequency of poverty falls as a result of an increase in the income of a poor person, the overall poverty level should not rise-add this must be true irrespective of the gap ratio I itself is clearly one example of a measure that violates this stronger form of monotonicity since the average gap can rise when a poor income crosses the poverty line.
- (xi) Therefore, the poverty measurement criterion such as food energy intake criterion, axiomatic criterion, has shown the ways of representation of poverty obly. But the aim of the researchers is to the represent the policy type contemporary technique to reduce poverty. Therefore the objective of those studies is to firstly, construct the relationship between the corporate social responsibility and poverty reduction, secondly, to construct. The multi-criterion non-linear fuzzy co-efficient model, thirdly, the representation of problem of global attainment programming, fourthly, the optimality condition. To achieve the minimum of poverty level in this system, the problem has been sowed for optimum order quantities and corresponding as pried and worst level value using generalized reduced gradient (GRG).

#### Best Practice - 2

#### 1. Title of the practice:

Community services through the students and staff of the college.

#### Goal:

The goal of introducing the practice is to attract the students and staff of our college to serve the society in regularly. The aim of the college authority is to develop the mental ability of the students and staff to serve the society in different ways.

#### 3. The context:

Community service is performed by someone or a group of people for the benefit of the public or its institutions. Performing community service is not the same as volunteering, since it is not always done for a variety of reasons:

Governments may require it as a part of citizenship requirements, typically in lien of military service.

Courts may demand it in lien of, or in addition to, other criminal justice sanctions-when performed for this reason it can also be known as community payback.

The College authority may mandate it to meet the requirements of a class, such as in the case of service- learning or to meet the requirements or graduation.

#### 4. The Practice:

The College also observes that:

- (i) The College authority prefers work experience over community service and some require that their students also continue community service for some specific number of hours to graduate.
- (ii) The College often takes students on community service projects in order for them to gain a greater understanding of how their individual actions affect the well being of the public.
- (iii) The Blood Donation camp, organized jointly by the College authority and Students' Union of the College was first held in 1984, the year when sent. Indira Gandhi, the then Prime Minister of India was assassinated by her security officer. From that point of time the College authority and Students' Union have been organizing the Blood Donation Camp on 28<sup>th</sup> August every year to fill up the terrible scarcity of blood in the locality and to extend support services to the disadvantaged patients of the Community During more than two decades these camps create a not of enthusiasm and excitement in the mind of students, faculty and all other stakeholders of the College.
- (iv) On the "Sadbhawana Divas" (20<sup>th</sup> August), which is the birth day of Late Rajib Gandhi, the former Prime Minister of India, every year, the students' Union leads the students of the college to visit the local hospital, Basulia rural Hospital, Mahishadal, Purba Medinipur, and students distribute fruits and others among the students. The College authority encourages the members of the students' Union and all students of the College to participate in such type of community service.
- (v) Rakhi Bandhan Utsab is observed every year in order to develop integration among the students coming from different castes, creed and religion. It also helps to develop a sweet relation among the students and staff.
- (vi) The Unit of N.C.C. organizes different awareness programmers every year with help of 55, Bengal Battalion, N.C.C. and local Police Station.
- (vii) The cadets of N.C.C. and local Police Station manage the huge gathering of men every year in the famous Mahishadal Ratha Jatra Festival.
- (viii) The 4 N.S.S. Units in their Puja Camp. Clean all garbage's and polluted materials of the 4 adopted villages clean all the ponds of Mahishadal to save the environment, clean the area of the Basulia rural Hospital and organize seminars in the different fields. In these seminars many people of Mahishadal Block were remain present. On every Tuesday in every month the students of N.S.S and N.C.C. participate in Social Services. The camp and Social services create a lot of enthusiasm and excitement in the mind students and people of locality.

#### 5. Evidence of Success:

- (i) As a result, the cadets of N.C.C. & N.S.S. and students of the College have become displaced and learn how to serve the community.
- (ii) The students of the College set up their mind to do the work taking great risk to save the people in a disastrous flood or natural calamity. They supply food, drinking water etc to the said people. As for example the cadets of N.C.C., N.S.S. members of the Students' Union, students and staff of our College help the people of severe flood effected area where other N.G.O's cannot able to enter into those areas in the year 2009.
- (iii) Some students of our college help the patients all time through an Association named "Bipanna Bandhu" (Mahishadal) in which the Principal of the college and other staff were the permanent members.
- (iv) Community Service also increases a participant's social connectivity. Because most community service opportunities allow others to interact and work with other individuals, this service may help volunteers network and connect with others towards a common goal.
- (v) Those involved in community service learning may also find that after serving the community for an extended period of time, they have an advantage in real-world experience.

#### 6. **Problems Encountered and resources required.**

- (i) Fifty percent of the students set up their mind to serve the community but rest portion can not engage to do such work.
- (ii) The College authority sanctioned some money to help the people of the flood affected area. But most of the Financial Expenditure cense from the fund of the N.C.C., N.S.S. and students' Union and some money from the begging.
